

Energy Label 2020

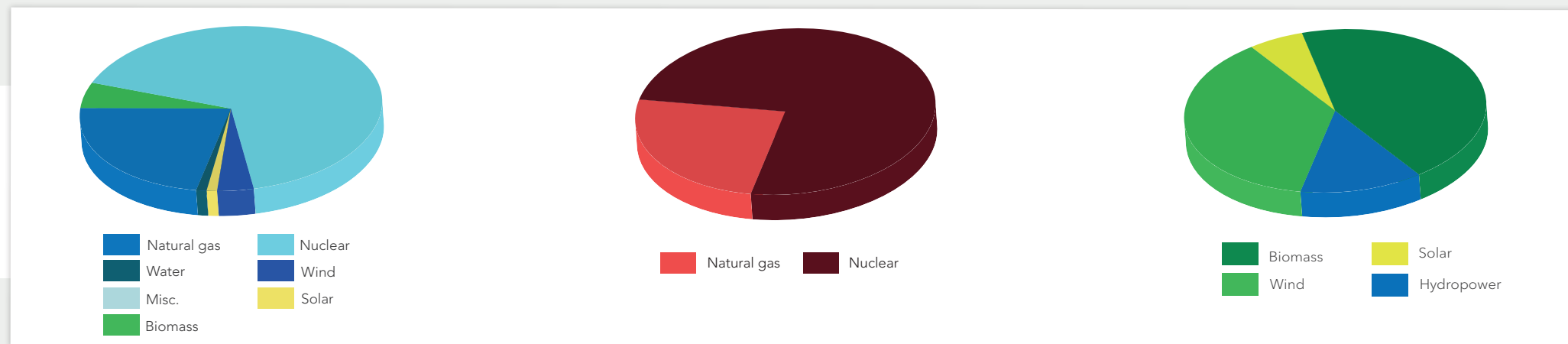
The Energy Label provides insight into the origin of the electricity which Scholt Energy supplied in the Netherlands in 2020. On the basis of this information, you can see how our total supply per product has been broken down in accordance with conventional and renewable energy sources. If you have Guarantee Green or Guarantee Wind, look in the column of the same name for the

origin of your electricity. If you do not purchase Green Electricity, look at the column 'Standard'. Conventional Energy Sources are natural gas, coal, nuclear energy and other non-renewable sources.

For the production of Green Electricity, Scholt Energy deploys wind power, solar energy and biomass. In this Energy Label, you also see the consequences for the environment of the various methods of electricity generation.

This is expressed in the CO₂ emissions and the quantity of nuclear waste that has come into being during the production of the electricity.
